HIWAY CLUB



The next meeting was held on February 25th in the Rowde Village Hall when there was a Quiz and Games evening.
















Rowde Village News Pledge

The key areas discussed at the monthly Parish Council meeting in February 2014 were:

Chairman's Announcements

 The Chair noted that the public consultation on the draft Devizes Neighbourhood Plan is open until 3rd March 2014.
 It is available for comments at: www.devizesareaplan.org.uk

Highways Update

- Wiltshire Council has arranged for the Community Steward to work in Rowde on 18th February to tackle outstanding grounds maintenance issues.
- Clerk had a site meeting with Rockstone Surfacing (12/2/14) which confirmed that its repair work on the potholes on Sands Lane remains intact. New potholes have developed since the work, due to problem with the infrastructure of the road and consistently bad weather.
- A letter was sent to the developer of the Old Bakery site to ask for contractors to remain considerate of residents in Maundrell Close when parking near the site. Communication has also been made with Aster Housing Association and the Community Police about the problem and letters have been sent to the residents of Maundrell Close to update them.
- Two pairs of kerbs have been identified and prioritised to be dropped. Wiltshire Council has guaranteed to match fund one pair of kerbs. A request for funding towards the second pair will be presented to the Community Area Transport Group (CATG) meeting on 10th March.
- Complaints have been received about the condition of Marsh Lane. The worst of the potholes have now been filled. Resurfacing will take place now in May.
- A complaint was made about travellers camping on The Common, Rowde. Wiltshire Council's Traveller Liaison Officer met with the travellers who were due to leave the site within a few days of the meeting.

Village Safety

Consultation on proposal for crossing on Caen Hill

• The Community Area Transport Group (CATG) for the Devizes Area has submitted a proposal to provide a safe place to cross Caen Hill, near the junction with Marsh Lane. The proposal includes dropped kerbs and a crossing point in the central reservation. If installed, it will mean that walkers or cyclists will cross two lanes of traffic at any one time rather than 4 in places.

 Rowde Parish Council agreed in principle to having a crossing place on Caen Hill. Councillors were concerned about the level of speed on the road. Suggestions were also made for safety rails around the areas, chevrons/ large warning signs, and a hatched area around the Marsh Lane junction to make a single lane. These recommendations will be forwarded to Wiltshire Council.

- PCSO Gareth Cole is leaving WC for Derbyshire Constabulary. Our Community Beat Manager will be PC Helen Clarke.
- PC Helen Clarke will be available to talk to at the Cross Keys car park on Friday 07th March 2014, between 2pm and 3pm, on Saturday 08th March 2014 from 2pm to 3pm
- There were no incidents of note during January 2014

Finance

- Parish Councillors agreed to remove the damaged double spring rocker in the toddlers' play area and to replace it with a bench. The Clerk will check the proposal with RoSPA before proceeding.
- Maintenance work on the Oak trees in the Large Playing Field was approved (£350). A quote for £300 has already been passed for work on the Oak tree on the allotments.

- There was discussion around the name of the project. It was suggested that the development should have a more inclusive, community name, for example 'The Activity Centre' to reflect the fact that the centre will be for everyone.

Planning Applications

The following applications were reviewed by the Parish Council:

- 13/06903/FUL Curry's Motors: Refurbishment of existing garage building including raising eaves height, new cladding and roofing. The Parish Council found no objections.
- 13/06882/FUL Rowdeford School; Installation of a fitness trail to include a tarmac pathway to access the trail from the car park area and a combination of sensory and easigrass pathways. The Parish Council supported the application.
- 14/00688/DEM Canal & River Trust; Demolition of mechanical and engineering workshop building at Canal and River Trust. The Parish Council found no objections.
- 14/01215/TPO Scholars Park: Work to TPO Trees. The Parish Council found no objections.

Village Website:

- Councillors agreed to work towards creating a new village website. In the meantime, Cllr A Boorman will maintain the existing website in its current format.
- It was suggested that local businesses may be asked for a contribution if they wish to advertise on or through the site. It was also suggested that there should be a discussion forum on the new website.

 An offer has been made to help with games/ equipment at the village fete.

Wiltshire Council update

- The adoption of WC's Core Strategy has been delayed by a minimum of 9 months. This leaves the Devizes Area vulnerable to new development. Wiltshire has been notified by central government that it will need to find land to build an additional 5000 houses.
- Devizes Campus project is moving forward. The next consultation is planned for the end of 2014. Sites are being considered.

We have the results of the veg box draw...
Hazel Aitken being the lucky winner of two £5 veg boxes. We will have another draw soon for another two boxes so keep an eye out for information. Our veg sales are rocketing due to the fantastic quality and price of the items. Do come and try some the quality has really improved since we have been using WPL and the prices are the same they charge in the market. Of course you are welcome to book a veg box for each week or fortnight please come in for a form or email me your requirements. This is a fabulous way of:

- 1. Supporting us,
- Getting your five a day
- 3. Using your fun five card
- 4. Buying five items from your grocery list per week.

Fresh Meat and Fish is available for you to order for a next day delivery. We hold a small amount of fresh meat which is changed every day or so but if you would like something specific we can order it and have it in-store the following day. Fish is the same, please order the day before and it is delivered the following day. If we get a large enough number of people ordering we can start stocking it again, we had to stop ordering it routinely due to the wastage. I know one comment from the AGM was to have more fresh

fish, meat and veg in-store. Our veg order has increased dramatically due to demand which enables us to buy a larger more varied amount and you more choice when you shop. The same will happen with the fresh meat and fish, so please try our local meat and freshly caught fish, the quality is great.

We have had another couple of new volunteers, thank you for coming forward. We could still do with people prepared to open, collect the papers on a Sunday and do things away from the shop like applying for grants and looking after our website or facebook page. Please email, phone or pop into the shop to have a chat with me for more details.

As always a recipe follows the article, if you have any ideas for recipes using ingredients from the shop please forward them to me, I love using ideas from others, look at the success of Lawerence Plumbs recipe!

VERONICA'S RECIPE BACON PASTA:

INGREDIENTS:

- 200g bacon chopped
- 1 large onion, finely chopped
- 2 large garlic cloves, crushed
- 800g tinned tomatoes
- 1 tbsp balsamic vinegar
- 350g pasta
- Grated cheese to serve

PREPARATION METHOD:

- 1.Heat the oil in a large sauté pan over a medium heat and fry the bacon until crisp, then remove to a plate lined with kitchen paper using a slotted spoon. Add the onion and garlic to the pan and sweat until soft. Stir through the tomatoes, squashing them with the back of a wooden spoon to release the juice. Add the balsamic vinegar and cooked bacon to the pan. Bubble for a few minutes until reduced and thickened, then season to taste.
- 2. Meanwhile, cook the pasta in a large pan of salted boiling water according to the pack instructions. Drain and add to the sauce. Stir to coat and divide among bowls. Serve with grated cheese and crusty bread, if you like.

Thoughts from The Rectory What's the point of fasting?

It's nearly Lent (and may well be so by the time some of you are reading this) and that is the time when many people traditionally give something up. But "Why should we fast if the LORD never notices? Why should we go without food if he pays no attention?" These words are from the Old Testament – giving up something for Lent has clearly never been popular!

Why do we do that – give up something we enjoy? The people of ancient Israel seemed to think that was what God wanted – but God wasn't impressed: "All that happens is you get cranky and grouchy and take it out on people who were worse off than you to begin with."

OK, I paraphrase, but the Old Testament tells people they shouldn't save up the food they're not eating so they can stuff themselves later (like some of us when we give up chocolate for Lent!) but to share what they don't eat with people who are hungry; to care for the homeless; to give away clothes they don't need to people with nothing to wear.

So, perhaps, instead of thinking negatively about what we're going to give up for Lent (perhaps making ourselves grumpy – or worse, smug! - by going without) why don't we think positively about what we could do for other people, people who need help in some way?

For instance – what about buying something extra and giving it to the FoodBank? You can bring donations to St Matthew at one of the coffee mornings, or if you come to the Lent course on Wednesdays.

It doesn't need to be much, to make a huge difference. Think about salt - just a pinch of it when you're cooking can make a huge difference to the flavour of the finished dish.

We can be like the salt. Giving something up; making ourselves grumpy; is a bit like salt losing its saltiness. But doing something – something that helps people in need – and doing it with a smile – that's like putting the salt in the cooking – the ketchup on the bag of chips. People will smile back. God will smile back!

And, I promise, that feels much better than stuffing yourself with chocolate on Easter morning.

Another wet and windy month with more flooding and blocked drains! We have been digging up field drains which have become dislodged or blocked by root material. Many of these tile drains were laid in the late 1800's and some have become silted up and unable to cope with the heavy rainfall. Usually you can clean them out and relay them, but if they are too badly affected we lay the modern alternative - perforated plastic pipe instead. There are plenty more to do when we have some dry weather to work in.



Drainage problems

The hedge planting is now completed. A lot of this has been done in the Countryside Stewardship Scheme which comes to an end this year. A total of 3.122 metres of new hedges have been planted over this time. The field margins (strips of uncropped grass around the field edges) have covered around 22 acres and have helped the numbers of small mammals and ground nesting birds. We are looking at the possibilities of entering into a new stewardship scheme in the autumn.

The first lambs were born over the weekend (22nd February) and the pigmy goats are also starting to kid. Unfortunately they will have to remain inside until the fields are a little drier. Goats tend to give birth relatively easily and quickly. The kids are generally standing up and feeding within an hour. So far we have had one twin and one single kid with seven more nannies waiting to give birth over the next few weeks. They should be growing well by Open Farm Day on 8th June.

Normally the crops would be starting to recover from the winter and we will be thinking about the first application of fertiliser to get them growing. Some of them are looking a bit patchy after all the rain but the oilseed rape has just started to grow a little and if you look carefully the flower buds are just visible in the centre of the plants.

February is also a time for office work. At least it is a warmer task. Planning for the year ahead takes up a lot of time, and we are already starting to decide which crops will be grown next year. Different species of crop (i.e. wheat, barley,

oilseed rape etc.) need to be rotated around the fields each year. The best way to prevent a build-up of diseases and pests is to grow a different crop in each field year by year. It looks as though we will be growing more oilseed rape in 2015 and a little less wheat. Budgets also have to be completed and with the bank manager due in March - this will be the next task!



NATURE NOTES - MARCH

OUR NATURE RESERVES

A breath of fresh air in wildlife conservation

Apart from our very own Caen Hill Locks, there's a whole new wildlife world out there, not far from Rowde, just waiting to be explored. From woodlands, wildflower meadows, hedgerows, streams, rivers, chalk downland, valleys, bogs and wetlands, now is the time to get out your boots, Barbour and binoculars and go wild in the country. What is really out there? Where is it? When can I see it? Why is it there? How can it survive? Come and visit one of our Nature Reserves and find out some of the answers. They are open all year and they're free!

Our Nature Reserves play an important part in raising awareness about the value of the natural world. They demonstrate how learning about this world can make our lives happier and more fulfilling, and what each of us can do to protect our environment.

Nearest to us are Peppercombe Wood* (near Urchfont), Conigre Mead (in Melksham), Morgan's Hill* (between Devizes and Calne), Vincients Wood* (near Chippenham), Green Lane Wood (near Trowbridge), Jones's Mill* (near Pewsey) and Hat Gate (between Pewsey and Marlborough).

* Not suitable for pushchairs or wheelchairs I will be telling you more about these wonderful places in the next few issues so, where shall we go this month? How about:

Morgan's Hill



History, rare wildlife and terrific views

If you walk up on Morgan's Hill between Devizes and Calne you will enjoy incredible views of Cherhill Down and the Lansdowne Monument, and the plains of north Wiltshire.

The nature reserve occupies the northern and northwestern slopes of Morgan's Hill, one of the county's highest points. Running along its northern edge is a Roman road, which once crossed the country from London to Bath.

The reserve is a Site of Special Scientific Interest for its orchids, butterflies and for the general quality of the chalk grassland. In spring and summer the down blazes with rare flowers.

Walkers and wildlife watchers may glimpse the endangered marsh fritillary butterfly, which feeds on the devil's-bit scabious found here during late summer. Defining the reserve's southern edge is the fifth century Wansdyke that was built to defend the

northern territory of Wessex. It was originally a large bank with a deep ditch in front, running all the way into Savernake Forest, near Marlborough. Today, the earthworks provide a home for early purple orchids and round-headed rampion.

It is believed the hill was named after a local man, John Morgan, who in 1720 was hung at this prominent site for murdering his uncle.

We are working with neighboring landowners to create living landscapes, using our Dexter cattle and Herdwick sheep to graze their fields. We are linking areas of species-rich chalk downland so that wildlife can move freely in response to the changing climate.

Peppercombe Wood



Pretty woodland wildflower walk

Peppercombe Wood is a strip of picturesque ancient woodland on the edge of Urchfont and a four-minute walk from the centre of the village.

The reserve lies on steep slopes next to a small stream and is well-hidden, at the end of a sunken lane. Visit during February to see the lower slopes blanketed by hundreds of snowdrops, and in later spring for a colourful mix of wildflowers.

Peppercombe was once full of stately elms but sadly most of these died when Dutch elm disease swept the country and we had to remove them in 1979. The following year we replanted many trees, mostly oak and ash and these, along with wych elm and hazel give the wood its character.



STOLEN LAND ROVER DUMPED IN ROWDE AND SET ON FIRE

Police plea after £33k theft including model steam train from Collingbourne Ducis businesses

Police are appealing for information following a burglary at two commercial premises in Collingbourne Ducis where thieves stole approx £33,000 of goods including a model train set. Thieves broke into Bourne Works, High Street, premises and stole 12 Warrior Winches for vehicles and various Snap On Tools in a Red Snap On tool box, on Friday, February 7.

A grey Land Rover Discovery was also stolen but was later found at Rowde. It had been set alight and was burnt out.

Thieves also stole a fully working model steam train described as a Gert Tank Engine. The value of good stolen adds up to about £33,000.

PC Ian Thackray said: "This appears to be a targeted burglary by thieves who were intent on stealing high value goods from these premises. I would like to hear from anyone who has information in relation to this incident. In particular, these goods may appear elsewhere as the suspects try to sell them on and we would like to hear from anyone who comes across these items or perhaps knows someone who is trying to sell them. The train set is quite unusual and there may be enthusiasts who may come across this item. I would encourage them to not to purchase such an item but speak to police immediately."

SUPPORT FOR SAFER ROUTE ACROSS DUAL CARRIAGEWAY

Devizes Town Council has given its support to measures to help pedestrians crossing the busy Caen Hill dual carriageway but has not pledged any money towards it. Devizes Area Board's transport group is exploring whether to install dropped kerbs at either side of the A361 dual carriageway by Marsh Lane to Rowde and near to the bus stops on the other side of the road, along with putting in a footpath on the central reservation. The work would cost £16,400. The area board's transport group said the measures would help walkers and cyclists as they would only need to cross two lanes of traffic at a time on the 70 mph speed limit road rather than four.

At a meeting of the town council's planning committee on February 4, councillor Peter

Evans, who is also on the area board's transport group, said: "There are children crossing the road when they get off the bus. At the moment there's no safe passage for people to get across the road. They walk across and stop on the grass in the middle." Coun Andy Johnson had concerns and said: "I think a bridge should go across the road. It's a very dangerous place for anyone to cross."

A number of councillors thought it was equally, if not more, important to have a pedestrian crossing further up Bath Road outside the Spar Shop. They were told the area board's transport group was also pursuing this.

Town clerk Sarah Todhunter said the earliest the council could consider giving funding would be in 2015/16. The planning committee agreed to support in principle the proposed crossing measures on Caen Hill.

Rowde Parish Council considered the proposal at their February meeting and agreed in principle to having a crossing place on Caen Hill. Councillors were concerned about the level of speed on the road. Suggestions were also made for safety rails around the areas, chevrons/ large warning signs, and a hatched area around the Marsh Lane junction to make a single lane.

ROLE AS CHARITY TRUSTEE FOR ROWDE PARISH COUNCIL LEADER

Jackie Bawden, chairman of Rowde Parish Council and a leading light in setting up its community shop, has become a trustee of volunteering body Community First.

Mrs Bawden moved to Wiltshire eight years ago and joined the



council in 2007. She said: "I want to see parish councils and community groups survive and thrive because it's the only way we can sustain and support villages, otherwise they will just turn into places where people sleep."

A former further education teacher, Mrs Bawden's interest in Community First was sparked when the parish council got help with its community-led parish plan. She said: "We worked together as a group to set up the parish plan and to find out about sources of funding that would help us. We identified the needs of the village and the people who would be prepared to work together to help improve it." Community First advised on the initial consultation and helped devise a questionnaire for households. Two steering groups were set up: one to develop the plan and one to open a shop; one of the main concerns that emerged. The shop, staffed by up to 30 volunteers, has been open for three years and is the hub of the community. The five-year village plan will soon have run its course and work is now starting on a new one.

Mrs Bawden said: "Community First set up meetings with other community shops, so we could see how it was done, and provided an expert to help us review our performance and expansion plans. By becoming a trustee, I hope I can support the charity in its valuable work."

COUNCIL TAX TO INCREASE

Rowde parish council has increased the council tax precept by 6.96 per cent to £43.66 for a band D property, an increase of just over £3 a year. The precept was frozen for the previous two years.

ROWDE MAN TEAMS UP WITH CHARITY TO KIT OUT GAMBIANS

Gambian Sainey Camara, who now lives in Rowde with his wife Veronica, has joined forces with charity Bag4Sport Foundation to help children in the area he grew up.

Mr Camara, who is called Charlie by the many people who know him in his role as a porter at The Bear Hotel, Devizes, is appealing to schools and clubs to donate unwanted uniforms, kit and equipment. He said: "The people in the region where I grew up are still incredibly poor and many parents can't afford to pay for school uniform. The youngsters also love to play football but they have no kit."

Bag4Sport director Andy Trusler will join him on a trip to the Gambia in April to meet the children. He said: "Money raised by our charity stays in Britain to help grass roots sport and up-and-coming athletes but when I heard from Charlie about the needs of these youngsters I knew it was something we could help with and local schools and clubs would want to be involved with. We also hope local schools might want to be linked with schools in Gambia and to stay in touch through letters and photographs. I am personally paying for my own trip to Gambia so no money will be used from the charity to fund it."

Mr Camara and his wife regularly visit Gambia to help charity projects and the couple sponsor a number of children through school. He said: "I know what it is like to be very poor and so we want to do everything we can to make life easier for these children. Most of their parents are farmers and they barely have enough money to survive." Mr Camara, who met his wife when he ran a beach bar in Gambia, faced a battle to get a visa to be allowed to come to England but after they married in Gambia in 2004 he was allowed to settle in Britain.

COUNCILLORS RUN TO SUPPORT FUND

Wiltshire councillor Laura Mayes is putting on her running shoes to raise money for the Gazette and Herald's appeal for Devizes Opportunity Centre.

Coun Mayes, who is the portfolio holder for children's services, believes Wiltshire Council had no choice but to pass on the £10,000 Government grant cut, but wants to do her own bit to fill the financial gap.

She will be running the Bath Half Marathon on Sunday, March 2 and hopes to raise about £500.

Coun Mayes, 47, who is married with two teenage sons, also sees the run as a personal challenge as she spent much of last year recovering from treatment for breast cancer.

She said: "It has been good for me to have something to aim for. I was only able to get back to running properly in the autumn and having the half marathon to aim for has been very good for me. I have decided to give all of the sponsorship money I raise to the opportunity centre as I know they do a tremendous job and they are local to me in Devizes. From a council point of view I think we are doing all we can to support them and the other centres in the county. We give them £70,000 a year while some other councils give similar centres no funding at all."

Coun Mayes, who was given the all clear from cancer when she saw her specialist earlier this month, will be joined on the run by her husband James.

But her regular training partner is Otto, the Miniature Shnauzer, who accompanies her on runs up and down the Caen Hill flight of locks at Rowde.

Coun Mayes of Roundway, said: "I am hoping to complete the run in just over two hours. I have run a half marathon in under two hours before but this time the challenge is more about the taking part."

STORMS AND FLOODING!

Fortunately nowhere near as bad as the effect on surrounding areas of the country, like the Sommerset Levels, but January and February have still been the worst months for weather most of us can remember in the village. Winds had been gusting up to 100mph through the region when an Atlantic storm hit southern England and as I write, more rain is forecast going into March. Fallen trees blocked roads at Rowde Common and on the road from Rowde to Roundway. The trees have since been moved and the roads were clear at time of going to print.

We have also had flooding in fields, gardens and cellars in and around the village. This is probably most noticeable at the bottom of Marsh lane as a huge lake appeared where previously there was a beautiful grassed area and property entranceway!

LONDON UNDERGROUND ORCHESTRA WITH SHAUN BUSWELL



Anyone who has travelled on the London Underground will have noticed that there is nearly always someone on the train with a musical instrument case. Intrigued by this observation Swindon musician Shaun Buswell set himself a challenge, to stage a concert by an orchestra made up entirely of strangers recruited on the Underground. In just under a year he'd done it and around 70 musicians played at the Shepherd's Bush Empire on 12 December 2012 as The London Underground Orchestra. The ensemble included members of famous orchestras, a trumpet player who recorded with Ray Charles and students from the Royal Academy of Music. First Launches Bus Fare Consultation across West of England

Local residents across the West of England are being asked what they think of bus services in their area in a major consultation exercise being run by bus company, First.

The latest review will look at all First's bus services covering the West of England areas outside of Bristol's inner zone. The consultation follows a similar major review of bus fares in and around Bristol last year, which led to significant changes being implemented with children and young people getting much bigger discounts on travel and the whole structure of fares in the city changed

Under the banner 'Fairer Fares for All', people will be asked to fill in either hard copy or online questionnaires regarding their use of buses, sharing their opinions regarding the fares charged. The results of the questionnaires will then be analysed by independent transport consultants before decisions regarding any subsequent changes are made.

Hard copy questionnaires will be available on buses, in libraries, in council one-stop-shops and in First's own travel shops to further aid people's ability to feed back their thoughts. A number of customer-facing road shows around the region are also being arranged. Separate consultation events will be organised for the region's councillors, which MPs will also be invited to attend. Further details will follow.

Talking about the consultation, Paul Matthews, Managing Director for First in West of England, says: "We need to better understand how people use our buses, how frequently they travel and for what purpose. We would also like to know what type of tickets they're buying at present and how they rate them in terms of value for money. All this data will then help us, and our transport consultants, determine the way forward. This is a mammoth task but it is an important one to enable us to provide the bus services that local people want."

Brian Allinson, Chair of the West of England Joint Transport Executive Committee, commented: "This is excellent news, buses play a vital role moving people around the area, and we need to make them as affordable as possible – the councils will be working with First to spread the word

and encourage people to take part in this consultation. It is really important that as many people as possible take part in the consultation so we can be sure that people from more rural areas as well as villages, towns and edge of the city have their say." The online questionnaire will be found at www.firstgroup.com/fairerfaresforall from 1 February and the consultation will run from then until 16 March 2014.





EATING OUT - THE SEVERN BORE INN

Inspired by a poem I had written many, many years ago when I still lived with my husband in Tintern, near Chepstow, just across the Severn Bridge, my son John suggested recently we should visit the Severn Bore Inn in Gloucestershire to have Sunday lunch there and make it a family outing.

So, we booked a table for 9 and I had my poem framed to take it down as a gift for the Landlord and Landlady, who turned out to be a very nice young couple. When I gave her the poem she was so thrilled with this gift and said she had just the place to hang it. (No, not in the toilet!)

Anyway, after an hour's drive and having passed many flooded fields and gone along the river Severn, which had, of course, burst its banks in many places after all the rain we have had over the past month and resembled more often a long, stretched out lake than a river, we arrived at the Severn Bore Inn. It is a Riverside country pub on the A48 between Minsterworth and Walmore Hill. It is an ideal vantage point to watch the Tidal Wave Phenomenon of which the Pub is named after. As the Easter School Holidays are just round the corner 'The Severn Bore' Tidal Wave would certainly be quite a spectacle to go and watch with the family - and what good excuse to call into the pub afterwards for a family meal to warm up?

This is a PUB not to be missed nor compared to a restaurant, and don't be put off by first impressions of the outside either. If you do, you will miss out on a great little unpretentious country pub, very friendly people and good pub food at great value. As we went for Sunday lunch we had the carvery – and what a feast it was! We did not only get a very generous helping of everything on offer but of good quality too, the beef was a little overdone for my son's liking (he prefers his rare) but no problem, as there was tasty gammon and pork on offer too and everything, including the good array of veg to choose from, was delicious and piping hot. There is also a good selection of well kept ale on offer, much to my son's delight. The home-made deserts were superb too, even though I could only have a taste of my children's choices as I had no room left, no matter how tantalising mouthwatering they all looked.

This is a typical pub where the saying holds so true: don't judge a book by its cover! Yes, the interior looks somewhat 'worn in' and the decor could do with some updating, but a lovely welcoming and warming central open fire and the cheerful, attentive landlord and landlady will let you very quickly forget about a few shortcomings in that area. They even have a heated skittle alley and very kindly allowed the children to play skittles after they had finished with their meal.

I wish them both the very best as they obviously love their trade and it shows in their enthusiasm. This pub deserves every success and a visit is certainly a 'must' when you are in the area to watch the Severn Bore. The hight of the tidal wave depends on the tide iself, of course, but if you catch the right day you will not be disappointed, like I was, when I saw it for the first time on a not so favourable day. A Community Speed Watch (CSW) team headed by Liz Ibbetson has operated in the village for nearly three years. The team is now reduced to a small band who continue

to dedicate their time to educate and remind drivers to reduce their speed in our village. At present the "speed monitoring device" is here in Rowde for a week on a monthly rota. We could operate now as many hour sessions as we like but the size of the team means that we only do a very small number of checks. Due, inevitably to absences, illness and personal commitments we will not be able to carry on with such a limited number of people. It would be a great shame not to be part of this scheme (approx. 70 throughout Wiltshire) Undoubtedly there is speeding in our village.

If you have perceived CSW as a paper tiger that will achieve nothing, please be assured that the rules are in the process of change, as you will note from the official data with information on persistant speeders that is also included in the magazine. The deterent(s) applied to speeders detected by CSW teams will be greater and applied with more diligence, so an increased number of volunteers may achieve more in CSW's attempts to reduce speed to 30 mph through Rowde. If you feel that you can spare as little as an hour once every four or five weeks to help with this important function please contact me or Liz Ibbetson to learn about the training and commitment. Please consider that there are various jobs to do apart from monitoring sessions, i.e. collecting/ delivery of the machine, co-ordinating the rota and the all important completion of the excel sheets after the monitoring sessions which are forwarded to CSW.




