
ROWDE BOOK CLUB

BOOK REVIEW "A Venetian Affair" by Andrea Di Robilant

A long hidden cache of letters, found in an old Venetian palazzo, form the backbone of this extraordinary book. Their narrative reveals an enthralling clandestine love affair spanning decades and also gives us glimpses and details of day to day life in eighteenth-century Venice.

We also learn of the hypocrisy and constraints of its society. Andea Memmo was heir to an illustrious and fiercely conservative noble family. He fell in love with Giustiniana Wynne, the illegitimate daughter of an English knight and clearly an unsuitable match. She was captivatingly beautiful, spirited and intelligent but unacceptable in Venetian Society. Driven to secrecy by disapproving parents, their letters, written in code, reveal the depth of their passion and hopeless predicament.



We learn what became of each over the next thirty years. It is so full of twists and turns that you have to remind yourself that it all really happened.

Some of the group found the book difficult to get to grips with, probably because the language and style of the letters, written from 1754 onwards, is unsurprisingly a little strange. However, for those who persevered, it was a fascinating account of two real lives, as gripping as any novel.

Your Parish Council

The key areas discussed at the monthly Parish Council meeting in January 2014 were:

Chairman's Announcements

- The Chair announced that a key aim for the Parish Council in 2014 is to support and encourage 'working together' in the village such as the planned Village Fête in the summer.
- Thank you was given to Pete & Pat Simmons for donating the Christmas tree to the village and also to the team who helped put it up, including Hugh Whittle, Neal Bawden, Robin Eccles, Pete Williams, Bill Ibbetson.

 Precept
- The precept has been set for 2014-15. It was agreed to increase the precept in order to continue to provide support for village groups and activities. Parish Council land must also be maintained and it has been indicated that Wiltshire Council will shortly start to devolve more of their responsibilities to parishes, such as grass cutting and verge maintenance. It is unlikely that there will be additional funds made available for this. In addition, Wiltshire Council will only pay 65% of the council support grant this year and the number of Band D houses in the village has dropped in the last year this is the band on which Wiltshire Council calculates the precept. As a result, the value of last year's precept would be worth significantly less in 2014-15.
 - o It was agreed that the precept will have to rise by 7p per week per band D household. The total amount received will be £27, 836.56, which is an increase of 6.96%. The precept for the previous two financial years has remained the same.
- Please see following for the new annual charge per household for 2014/15:

Band A household=£37.43; Band D household=£43.66; Band C household=£49.90; Band D household=£56.14; Band E household=£68.62; Band F household=£81.09; Band G household=£93.57; Band H household=£112.28

Finance

- Membership of the Webbs/Wicks Trust Committee has not changed. When a vacancy arises, the Parish Council will be notified.
- Clerk's salary was increased in November after an appraisal. The new pay salary was set at point 30 on scale

LC2, on the National Salary award for Local Council Clerks 2013/14. The Clerk's contracted hours are 15 hrs per week.

 The costs of having a village Christmas tree were discussed. There was no cost for electricity in 2013, and none is expected for 2014 due to the new energy efficient LED bulbs. The tree is also kindly donated.

Highways Update

- Cllr Bentley was thanked for his report on roads and pavements in the village. A site meeting took place with Cllr Bentley, the Clerk and a senior WC Highways Technician and the following can be reported:
 - o Potholes, litter and graffiti can be reported directly to Wiltshire Council through their interactive service at 'My Wiltshire' app.
 - Marsh Lane from the Cross Keys junction to past Rowde Court will be completely resurfaced shortly.
 - o The bottom of the Church drive will be completely resurfaced after February.
 - o The creation of a lay by area on Bunnies Lane was discussed (to create more parking spaces) and it is thought that the work would cost in excess of £3K which WC does not have the funds for. WC will clarify where the Highways boundary goes up to.
 - o There is an issue of the road narrowing opposite West End Farm, which may have resulted from soil dumped on the verge which over time has narrowed the road. WC is investigating it further.
 - o Rowde is scheduled to have a road sweeper every 3 4 months which can remove

moss from pavements and weeds from kerbs. It can also be tasked with cleaning up dog fouling.

- Cllr Bentley, Cllr Boorman and the Clerk met with a WC Senior Traffic Management Engineer to discuss weight restriction signs on Cock Road/Sands Lane/Bunnies Lane junction. WC has agreed to carry out the following changes before the end of the financial year: A342 High Street to provide bend / junction warning sign and SLOW road marking; Cock Road to replace village nameplate and 30 mph / national speed limit signs; Cock Road junction with Bunnies Lane to provide weight limit sign; and end of weight limit sign; Cock road junction with Sands Lane to provide weight limit sign.
- WC has also secured footway resurfacing opposite George & Dragon pub towards Slades garage, plus surface repairs at the junction to Maundrell Close.
- At the Devizes Area Board meeting held on Monday 25th November, a proposal for pedestrian improvements at the junction of A361/B3101 Caen Hill was discussed. The key aim of the proposal is to find a cost effective way of ensuring that no more than 2 lanes need to be crossed before a safe refuge is reached. Costings will be put together and then reported back to the next Community Action Traffic Group (CATG) in January.

Village Safety

• The stile at the junction of footpath Rowde 13 with the bridleway south west of Lower Durlett Farm has been replaced. WC will also investigate a problem on footpath Rowde 6.

Dog fouling

• The Dog Warden has reported an unusual increase in dog fouling in this area. Concerns about dog fouling should be reported to John Quinn, the Dog Warden at Wiltshire Council, at: john.quinn@wiltshire.gov.uk, or by telephoning: 0300 456 0100 or visiting the dog fouling section of Wiltshire Council's website.

Salt spreading

 The Parish Council declined to purchase a tailgate salt spreader for use in the parish. A hand pushed unit was suggested instead. Cllrs B Bentley and A Boorman will draft a snow plan.

Village Maintenance

- The Hill: Areas of The Hill have been re-seeded and the pathway replaced with more substantial material after the completion of the repair works to the wall of Prospect House's garden. WC has confirmed that they will cordon off the area to allow the seed to grow. The current dog fouling signs will be removed and replaced with stickers on the lampposts.
- Mr Eccles has kindly offered to re-set the 'Best Kept Village' plaque into the wall of Prospect House.
- Small Playing field: The gate entering the toddlers playing area has been secured, with a post and rails erected behind gate to reduce pressure on the spring
 - o Bolts have been tightened on the climbing wall, and the bearings on the rotator turnstile have been oiled.
 - o The bin in the blue sheltered area has been replaced.
- Large playing field: the broken back boards on the basketball post have been removed and the backing painted over.

Police

Reports were given that on:

- 01/11/2013 An unknown suspect has stolen a phone from a vehicle whilst it was left unattended at Jones Scrap Yard on Caen Hill, & on
- 13/11/2013 A single vehicle road traffic collision occurred where a car collided with a hedge by Horse Lane Farm. No person was injured.

Allotments

• The hedge bordering the allotments and the large playing field has been cut back.

Sports Field Development

 A member of the public has requested a public consultation on the future development plans for the large playing field. A public meeting will be held on Wednesday 5th March 2014, at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. Everyone is welcome.

Planning Applications

The following applications were reviewed by the Parish Council:

- 13/06880/FUL Proposed carport with electric vehicular door: The Old Bakery, High Street. After some discussion, no objections were found.
- 13/06934/LBC Listed building consent for alterations and extension to dwelling: The Villa, High Street. No objections were found.

Wiltshire Council update

- The adoption of WC's Core Strategy has been delayed by 9 months. This leaves the Devizes Area vulnerable to new development. Devizes Area Board has been in discussion with the Inspectors.
- It was noted that WC is trying to identify a unified approach towards dealing with solar planning applications.

Village Fete

• The Parish Council is supporting the setting up of an independent village fete committee. Please contact Steve Mundy on 01380 727598 if you would be interested in helping in any way you can.

VERONICA'S RECIPE Fabulous Cheese Scones: INGREDIENTS:

- 250g plain flour
- 3 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 50g butter
- 1 egg
- 250ml milk
- 120g grated Cheddar cheese
- 100g sultanas or raisins

PREPARATION METHOD:

- 1. Sift flour with baking powder, salt and paprika. Rub in butter finely. Stir in remaining ingredients just until dry ingredients are moistened.
- 2. Spoon into well-greased muffin tins. Bake in a preheated 220 C / Gas mark 7 oven for 25 minutes.

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Good Neighbour News Age UK Befriending

Have you heard about Age UK's Befriending Service? If you live alone and feel a bit isolated maybe you could benefit from it. Or maybe you have some time on your hands and could consider being a volunteer befriender yourself. There are 2 sorts of befriender :- telephone befrienders work from the Age UK office in Devizes for a few hours a week. They ring the same people each week, have a good chat and get to know them. Home Visit Befrienders visit someone living alone each week, to offer support and friendship. There may be someone living near to you who has requested a befriender. Could you be that person? If you are interested please ring Age UK on 01380 727767.

On a completely different note – I have recently heard of a lady who was told by her gas company that she was £500 in debt. She didn't feel that this was correct. She asked a neighbour to read her meter. The gas company had misread the meter and the lady was, in fact, in credit. If a bill, like this, seems totally unreasonable, make sure you get someone to check it out for you, before you pay.

Surviving Winter

The Community Foundation has released details of this year's Surviving Winter grants. These are for people who are living in fuel poverty. This means that they spend about 10% of their income on fuel. There is a one off payment which can be used to pay for electricity, gas or other fuel used during the colder winter months. If you would like to apply for this grant, please give me a ring and I will visit and fill in the application form.

If you receive means tested benefits, like pension credit, other grants may be available. These include replacing old and inefficient boilers, having extra loft insulation or cavity wall insulation put in. Do contact me to see if you are eligible.

Thoughts from The Rectory

The church year can be very confusing – quite apart from things like the variable dates for Easter and the first Sunday of Advent, there are the practical problems of reflecting 33 years of life in a mere 12 months. But every so often, the church slows down and looks at that life in real time – Holy Week is the most obvious example, but right now – in the period between Christmas and the Feast of the Presentation (also known as Candlemas) - is probably my favourite.

This is the time between the birth of the Christ child and his presentation in the Temple, in accordance with Jewish tradition, so we know that it must have been 40 days after the birth. 40 days that Mary and Joseph needed to recover from their journey and to adjust to the joys and practicalities of parenthood, not to mention the mysterious appearances of stars, angels, shepherds and wise men. Time that we also need to absorb the wonderful news of God made man for love of us which we heard afresh in the Christmas services.

This is why so many churches keep their Christmas decorations after twelfth night – traditionally, twelfth night marks the end of a secular midwinter festival and has no Christian significance. After all, if the church stopped celebrating Christmas at twelfth night, we would miss out on Epiphany: the time when the wise men from the east brought their gifts to the baby – gifts which both recognised his unique status and foretold his death.

Then, at Candlemas, the baby was recognised again – this time by Simeon and Anna – as the light which had come into the world for everyone. Perhaps not surprisingly, this became celebrated by blessing candles which would be used on special occasions throughout the year – sometimes to comfort the dying or, in some traditions, as protection during thunderstorms.

I started by saying the church year was confusing – but I think that can be a good thing. The church should be about real time, which is the time in which we live and in which God breaks into our lives. And that's not just in the 12 – or even the 40 – days of the Christmas season: it can be every day, if we let him.

HELP AND SUPPORT FOR PEOPLE WHO CARE

According to the last census, there are 47,608 people in Wiltshire providing care and support to a



relative, child, partner or friend who would not be able to manage on their own.

There are many reasons why someone may not be able to cope unaided including physical or mental disability, old age, long-term illness, special educational need, eating disorder or a problem with drugs or alcohol. It is estimated that 3 in 5 people will become a carer at some point in their lives. The problem is that most people will not identify themselves as such – people simply consider themselves as a spouse, sibling, parent, grandparent or friend doing what they would be doing anyway. Many also mistake the word 'carer' with those providing paid care work in a residential home or domiciliary agency capacity.

Carer Support Wiltshire is a charity with a team of support workers who can provide information and support to carers living in Wiltshire, at the other end of the telephone, or face to face, along with accessing to counselling and advice relating to your role. All of our services are free and confidential for anyone aged 18 and over and we can offer you the chance to have a break through social cafés, days out, activities, craft groups and complementary therapies.

The New Year has certainly started off a bit like 2013 in weather terms! The total rainfall here on the farm last year was 912mm which is around 250mm more than the average for the previous four years. We have already had 107mm up to the 18th January 2014. The ducks now have two ponds – the new one and another flooded area of the field. There are a network of underground drains which have a tendency to block up with root material at this time of year, so some maintenance will be required over the next few days.

January is the time of year for a range of maintenance tasks on the farm. Last week we were preparing an area of the yard in front of the machinery shed for concreting. We have used some crushed stone to level the area up

– the next task is to get our levels correct! We have also been hedge planting. A new hedge is going in behind the new grain store to create a screen with some flowering shrubs to attract the bees. There are also some trees to plant around the pond and complete the landscaping. We have chosen Alder, Maple and Ash. Over the last ten years we have established a number of new hedgerows around the farm. They have mostly taken well and this year we are going round and replacing any dead

plants. Only about 4% failed to grow – mostly in a single hedge which was planted just before a very dry spring. The main species are hawthorn, blackthorn, spindle, maple, hazelnut and wayfaring tree. Unfortunately the deer seem to enjoy the prickly varieties and some of these have struggled to get going.

Most of our school visits take place in the January to July period but this academic year we have had more in the autumn than usual. So far around 400 children from Wiltshire schools have visited since September. It looks as though we will have around 1200 visitors by the end of July. They are here for two hours and the period is split into a class session, where they learn about food sources by milking our life-size model cow, grinding wheat, making oil from oilseed rape and many other activities. The second hour is spent outside, mainly with the animals – one of the favourite jobs is collecting the eggs from the chickens, although not everyone is so keen when the hen is still sitting on the nest! This week a number of degree students from a local college have been here learning about cropping and looking at soils. At the moment we are investigating some alternative themed visits to offer next year. some of which may be of interest to the village.

Finally some grain has been leaving the farm and going off to be processed. The oats are being taken to a mill in Crewe to be used in muesli production, and the oilseed rape has gone to Erith in south east London, where it is processed into cooking oil. We also grow an industrial type of oilseed rape which goes to Hull where it is used in the plastics industry – mainly cling-film and bottle seals.

We are really looking forward to seeing everyone at these events. Last year we have had a great entry and atmosphere at our events and this year, again, we will have great rosettes and trophies for all entrants. We are looking for sponsors for the classes at these events and have spaces for trade stands, so if anyone is interested - prices start at £15 - please contact me for details.

Just a few notes on staffing: our volunteer Sue is no longer at the centre but we do have some work experience pupils who come and help out to gain experience working with the animals. Of course, we always welcome volunteers (hot drinks and cakes/biscuits supplied). Whatever time you may have spare, please contact me.

You will be pleased to read that we have had our annual inspection by Wiltshire Council (two very friendly animal health and welfare officers came

and did an inspection of animals and paperwork etc) and they are happy with the health and welfare needs of the animals as well as all the legal paperwork and requirements being met. Alas, we are very happy that we are doing things right in the authorities' eyes.


Oh, and by then you will be able to see our new banner on display which we had made.

NATURE NOTES - FEBRUARY

Have you ever found a sick, injured or orphaned animal and wondered where to find help and advice? Well, for this month's Nature Notes I thought I might tell you about an excellent organisation we have right here in Wiltshire.

The Wiltshire Wildlife Hospital

Registered charity number 1056375



The Wiltshire Wildlife Hospital provides a 24-hour rescue and advice service for Wiltshire's wildlife. Our team of dedicated volunteers rescues, treats, cares for and rehabilitates mammals, birds and reptiles in preparation for their release back to the wild in and around the Wiltshire area.

All animals admitted are given the same care and attention, regardless of species.

What should I do if I come across a wild animal in distress?

There's no easy answer to this question, as every case is unique. However, we've put together some basic guidelines which are designed to minimise stress for animals and to assist people in managing the situation.

Stop and think carefully about what you're doing before rushing in. Phone us and check first if you're unsure about anything. Take note of the location where you found the animal, including any landmarks or nearby buildings. If appropriate, try to mark the spot so you can find it again easily.

Make sure you don't endanger your own life or others' lives. If you come across an injured animal on the road, make sure it is safe to stop and pull off the road. Use hazard lights and a reflector. Try to assess the situation – if an animal is injured, is it safe for you to pick it up?

Animals in distress are frightened and may be in pain. To prevent injury to yourself, avoid handling

the animal. All wild animals may carry diseases - be cautious and wear protective clothing. If the animal is immobile, you can place a blanket over it to keep it calm and warm.

Call us first before bringing the animal to the hospital, as it may need to be taken somewhere else. Avoid feeding wild animals. For example, many people don't realise that feeding bread and milk to birds or hedgehogs will kill them.

What if I find an abandoned baby animal?

Baby animals should not be handled if possible. Think about the situation carefully – perhaps the mother has left her young for a reason and will return later. Remember, phone us and check first if you're unsure about anything. If the animal needs to be moved because it's in danger and does not appear to be injured, move it to a safer position nearby so the mother has a chance of finding it. If the baby is abandoned, call us for advice.

Please note that the Wiltshire Wildlife Hospital deals with the rescue, care and release of injured, sick or orphaned indigenous animals. We don't handle cases of animal abuse or animals that are causing an inconvenience.

Christopher had a difficult time releasing the hedgehog, but eventually succeeded. Despite a very swollen front paw, there were fortunately no broken bones. Anti-inflammatory cream was administered and he's made an excellent recovery.

We need your help!

The Wiltshire Wildlife Hospital is treating an increasing number of animals and relies solely on memberships and donations. Every patient needs suitable accommodation, a specific diet, warmth, a quiet environment, regular care and monitoring. They may also need veterinary treatment and medication. Help them by becoming a supporter or donating towards this much-needed cause.



Many thanks, Darren HUGH AND ALAN VISIT TEDWORTH HOUSE RECOVERY CENTRE



After the successful launch and sale of a charity book in aid of Help for Heroes by local Rowde residents Hugh Whittle and Alan Watters, they were both invited to a tour of Tedworth House at the end of November.

Tedworth House in Tidworth is one of four Recovery Centres run by Help for Heroes, which forms part of the Defence Recovery Capability. Tedworth House aims to inspire the wounded, injured and sick and returning veterans to lead active, independent and fulfilling lives, which will enable them to reach their full potential and to support them and their families for life. It is a place of opportunities providing education, training, sport and adventure in a relaxed, understanding and caring environment. State of the art facilities and dedicated staff aid the path to recovery.

You may think that this describes Tedworth House and it seems there is little more to say but we soon found out what a truly amazing facility it is.

We started our day at The Boot Inn, Shipton Bellinger. Here we had an excellent lunch

and met up with the others in our tour party, members of the H4H supporting charity 'Words for the Wounded' (W4W). This turned out to be a very worthwhile session as we found ourselves in the company of some very interesting authors and were able to exchange fundraising ideas and experiences. Time flew by as we ate and chatted so we hurriedly had to make our way to nearby Tedworth House. And in case you are wondering, as I initially did, why it is called Tedworth House when it is in Tidworth, we had it explained later that when the house was first built Tidworth was actually called Tedworth. Mystery solved!

We walked from the car park to reception, past Simon Dyer's evocative sculpture and then on into the majestic foyer. Apparently Help for Heroes wanted only the best for their mates and that the house would be as splendid as it had been when it was a private house and then an Officers' Mess. They have succeeded.



Firstly we listened to a presentation by the Centre Manager, Giles Woodhouse in which he explained the ethos of Help for Heroes, focusing as he did so on some of their inspiring recovering personnel. He underlined, also, the need to continue raising funds. Did you know that many of the wounded are aged between 20 and 24 and will continue to need back up for 50 years if not more? Added to this is the fact that the troops will be out of Afghanistan soon, and probably out of the public eye, but Giles made clear that the needs of the recovering must not also fade. So we all have work to do. After the presentation, Front of House Team Leader Susan Gibbings led us off on the tour. Beginning outside, we went past the playground for the children of those staying



or visiting here and the woods that the personnel make full use of.

Once back inside we saw that the facilities are numerous and wondrous, there is a ski slope, a swimming pool, both 'resistant' so it must be a bit like going down an 'up' escalator. You have to work really hard and work against the current.

The gym was perfect then, going outside again, so too the basketball pitch on which many other adapted games are also played. On and on we went. We even glimpsed an equestrian centre then back into the main house and a look at the rooms. There are beautifully furnished single and family rooms and privacy is ensured with the provision of a nearby kitchen so people can come and go as they please. Everywhere there are cheerful paintings and prints on the walls, all of neutral subjects which won't trigger unpleasant memories. Nothing has been left to chance. There is a creative arts room where all sorts of activities take place including creative writing workshops.

And all too soon really, the tour was over. It certainly was a thought provoking experience. Tedworth House Recovery Centre is utterly essential to the recovery of our wounded - physical and emotional. It made us more grateful than ever to those of you who have bought 'Poetry, Prose and Pictures' or have donated to the book's own charity fundraising webpage. We are also grateful to the W4W organization who let us chum along with them on the tour.

Finally, I must let you know that the amazingly popular Poetry, Prose and Pictures' second and final print run is nearly exhausted but we still have just a few copies left. THE BIG BREAKFAST!



Ann and I booked the charity 'Breakfast Experience' at Vine Cottage in Bunnies Lane, Rowde on Sunday 18th January and a thorougly enjoyable experience it certainly turned out to be. We were joined by six other lucky diners and we all agreed that the food was deVINE! On top of that, the friendly and relaxed atmosphere evoked some interesting and amusing chat! Before we left I was curious to find out how this wonderful venture in aid of the RNLI came about and the following story was revealed.

Ben served 37 years in the Royal Navy before retiring in 2002. When Ben and Mary got married in 2003, they decided to have charitable donations in lieu of presents. Being a 'mature' couple they didn't need the usual gifts. The RNLI and RSPCA were their selected charities and so they asked for collecting boxes to be placed at the reception. The RNLI box was delivered by John Box (Chairman of the Devizes branch of the RNLI) at their home in Devizes. He was interested to hear about Ben's Naval career and that they were soon to move to Bunnies Lane in Rowde. Ben had lived in Rowde before and two others from the branch committee still lived there at that time. Ben was immediately earmarked as a possible committee member and sure enough John was soon in touch and Ben 'volunteered'. For most of those years he has also been the branch treasurer. Three months ago Mary filled a vacancy and is now also on the committee.

In September 2008, after converting the cottage to having three en-suite bedrooms they opened Vine Cottage Bed and Breakfast. The first 2 years were difficult as they juggled a nursing and satellite communication job with running the B&B, however they both retired from the 'day jobs' in the summer of 2010 and

have since worked solely at the B&B. The success of their business has surprized both of them; they have won and earned numerous accolades and awards, including a breakfast award from both Visit Britain and AA.

Despite a recent increase in business trade, the winter months are inevitably quieter for tourism trade and last year they decided to add another fund raising event to the calendar by introducing the £10 charity breakfasts. £7.50 from each meal is donated to the RNLI and last year proved a great success over the 5 week period with £300 (including donations) being raised. THREE FOOD FIRMS ON SHORTLIST FOR AWARDS

Three local food businesses have been shortlisted as finalists in the south west regional final of the Countryside Alliance Awards.

Poulshot Lodge Farm Shop is in the local food category, while Rowdey Cow cafe and ice cream parlour is in the start-up category and Country Butchers is in the butcher category. They are all up against three other finalists in their category.

Andy Hobbs, manager of Country Butchers, in Little Brittox, Devizes, said: "It's a good achievement. We are voted for by our customers."

The shop, owned by butcher Daniel Curtis, has been open almost three years and the number of staff has grown from two to five, including an apprentice.

Mr Hobbs said: "We do traditional butchery with a modern twist. We don't wear sterile white jackets, we have jokes on our blackboard and we have music on in the shop."

Poulshot Lodge Farm Shop, owned by the Hues family of farmers, opened in July 2010 selling its own home-reared beef as well as locally-sourced pork, lamb and poultry. As well as meats the shop sells fruit, vegetables, eggs, cheeses, chutneys and bread from local producers.

Rowdey Cow, at Lower Farm, Rowde, run by Sue Thompson, opened almost two years ago and uses the milk produced by her father, Adrian White's dairy cows to make gelato, Italian style ice cream. The ice cream parlour has 30 different flavours. The cafe sells hot food.

NEW ROUNDWAY DOWN BOOK

Amateur historian Keith Genever's 38 years of researching the Battle of Roundway Down has led to him writing a book.

Mr Genever, 73, has found many artefacts on the hill over the years by extensive metal detecting. His discoveries have led him to dispute some of the earlier versions of where the battle was fought.

His investigations support local historian Dr Lorna Haycock's theory about the location of the battle.

Mr Genever, of Waylands, Devizes, said: "The Battle of Roundway Down started between Morgan's Hill and Roughridge Hill on the top of Roundway Down. That's half a mile from where it was thought to be. The troops walked all the way down the field and were pushed across to Roundway Culvert. In that field I found cannon balls and musket shot. That's where it ended. I have read seven accounts of the battle and they are all different. Lorna Haycock wrote a book ten years ago about it. Hers and mine match up quite well. Colonel Burns in 1920 wrote an account of it and he is spot on. The evidence I have for my book is what I have found through metal detecting.

Historians have been proved wrong in the past – the battles of Hastings and Bosworth were found to be in the wrong areas."

Mr Genever began metal detecting in 1975 to relax from his job as a psychiatric nurse at Roundway Hospital.

His book took him nine months to write and it includes a map of where he says the battle started and ended and a walk around the battle sites. The book also covers the siege of Devizes beforehand when the Parliamentarians camped on Jump Hill and fired on St James' Church. The 70 page book, called 'The Civil War Comes to Devizes' and which Mr Genever published himself, features photos and sections on Civil War armoury, coinage and commanders.

His initial print run of over 60 sold out and more have been printed available at Devizes Books, price £12.50. Any profits will go to WiltshireAir Ambulance and Cancer Research UK.

Mr Genever said: "I'm so overwhelmed that people have bought the book. It was my first effort and I had help with my grammar. It has proved popular because it is about Devizes."

TEETHING PROBLEM WITH POTHOLE APP

Tweaks are being made to Wiltshire Council's highway repairs smartphone app after reports of faults with the service.

Since launching in September the free app, My Wiltshire, which allows the public to pinpoint highways complaints including poor road surfaces and vandalised street signs, has been downloaded by 450 people with 515 complaints being logged.

Those submitting issues are asked to take a picture of the problem



which registers the location through the global positioning system, logs it with a highways repair team and adds it to their repair schedule. Wiltshire councillor John Thomson, cabinet member for highways, has trialled the service, which is part of the council's £125m five-year highways deal with Balfour Beatty Living Places. He said he has submitted 80 reports on the app.

"Some of the problems I've noticed is that the GPS doesn't always correspond with the logged complaint," he said.

"When this is the case there needs to be improved communication through the app contacting the person who logged the report." He said: "It has not been perfect but these things take time, the trouble is when you are pioneers problems will happen and others will copy when you've addressed them."

There is a software update available, and everyone who has the app should download that as it allows the app to run much smoother.





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

A Community Speed Watch (CSW) team headed by Liz Ibbetson has operated in the village for nearly three years. The team is now reduced to a small band who continue to dedicate their time to educate and remind drivers to reduce their speed in our village. At present the "speed monitoring device" is here in

Rowde for a week on a monthly rota. We could operate now as many hour sessions as we like but the size of the team means that we only do a very small number of checks. Due, inevitably to absences, illness and personal commitments we will not be able to carry on with such a limited number of people. It would be a great shame not to be part of this scheme (approx. 70 throughout Wiltshire) Undoubtedly there is speeding in our village.

If you have perceived CSW as a paper tiger that will achieve nothing, please be assured that the rules are in the process of change, as you will note from the official data with information on persistant speeders that is also included in the magazine. The deterent(s) applied to speeders detected by CSW teams will be greater and applied with more diligence, so an increased number of volunteers may achieve more in CSW's attempts to reduce speed to 30 mph through Rowde. If you feel that you can spare as little as an hour once every four or five weeks to help with this important function please contact me or Liz Ibbetson to learn about the training and commitment. Please consider that there are various jobs to do apart from monitoring sessions, i.e. collecting/ delivery of the machine, co-ordinating the rota and the all important completion of the excel sheets after the monitoring sessions which are forwarded to CSW.

WHAT A WASTE!

Hi Alan.

I thought maybe some of the village magazine readers might find this of interest, certainly those who pay water rates to Wessex Water.

For those of us who walk down the Common, may have noticed just prior to the entrance of Smithwick Farm, fresh water flowing up from under the road and running down towards the farm entrance before being diverted into a ditch.

This has been like this since the beginning of November and I reported this to Wessex Water on 14th November.

As of the 3rd December, apart from the leak being marked with a blue spray marking,

nothing else had been done so being of an inquisitive nature, I phoned Wessex Water. I inquired as to the progress of fixing the leak, stating to them that some 95000 litres of water had been wasted already.

To my surprise, I was informed that this leak was not due to be fixed until 3rd March 2014!

Allowing a leak rate of 2 litres per minute, which is a conservative estimate, that would work out at 354,240 litres of water lost or put it another way 77,923 gallons!

Let's hope we don't have a hosepipe ban this coming year.

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


